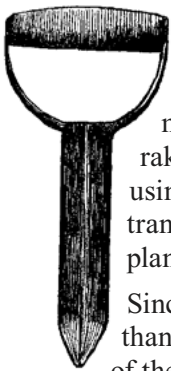

A Dibble, By Any Other Name!



Dibble...the name of a wonderful little tool used throughout England in years gone by. This humble and obscure tool makes gardening a lot easier although I would use it whether it made gardening sense or not. And I suppose a stick or hoe would work almost as well but I like the exactness of the planting hole the dibble makes. The name even sounds easy. It does not have the 'nose to the grindstone' sound like the words shovel, rake, crowbar, and rototiller. And with its use comes the last, easiest, and most fun part of planting our garden; using the dibble to make small, rather pointed holes. I can easily make 'knot garden' designs of green leaf lettuce transplants curved into red leaf lettuce transplants or lacy carrot foliage circled into dark, bold spinach leaves. I can plant in rows or I can do it all free hand. The dibble allows me to plant an artistic vegetable garden.

Since we look down on our vegetable garden from our house, it just makes sense to have fun with the garden rather than do the same thing with straight rows year after year. My old dibble is my favorite garden tool; in part because of the whimsical name, in part because of the uniqueness of the tool and in part because of the association with that wonderful tired and satisfied feeling of a complete day of work in the garden, since a dibble can only be used after we have done all the hard work and used up the better part of the day preparing our vegetable garden for the coming season. And, this antique tool always reminds me how very close those lives are that at times seem so far past. There is something comforting about repeating a springtime ritual that has been repeated over and over down through the ages. I like using a tool that has been worn by the hands of time, even if I do not know that tool's history. There is something so basic about good weather, fragrant and nutritious soil, vegetable seedlings and old wooden tools. It is another reminder that while high tech is developing at warp speed, something as basic as growing food for our families has not changed for centuries. And, at least for our family, it is during the last little bit of blissful dusk on a warm May evening that we finish planting, put the dibble and other garden tools away, sit down with a cup of tea and listen to Nat King Cole while watching darkness catch the twilight, happy with another official start of our vegetable gardening year.

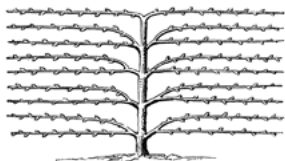
How to Prune...So You Don't Have to Prune So Often
